1:30 – 3:00 p.m.	<p>Concurrent Sessions on Various Topics*</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- How to care about and for family members without getting eaten up in the process: Some of us find ourselves in “helping” roles with aging parents, adult children, impaired siblings, and/or partners or spouses. The drain may be emotional, financial, or physical. In this session we will share our experiences, hope, and strength as we face these challenges.- Climate change and racism: This session will provide opportunities for personal reflection and connecting with former classmates about our experiences, challenges, hopes, and plans related to these key issues. During the past few years, it seems that the veil that had been covering racism in our nation is being gradually removed, and many are feeling empowered to express and act-out their racial bias. At the same time, climate change poses an immense threat to humans and other life forms. In this session we will invite participants to share how these issues have affected each of us directly or indirectly and look at some of their interconnections. We will explore how we as Obies of '69 might help bring about racial justice and contribute to stopping climate change. The session will be interactive and participatory.
